Rochester historian and author Ray Bruzan recalls his 1977 interview with the former owner of Edgewood, the Orange Judd farm home located on Oak Road that was demolished in 2021. for her science project."

"My neighbor, (the late) Bob Ritterbusch, suggested I speak with Elmer Boehme, who lived at Edgewood, to learn of his farm methods and operation. After being greeted by him and sitting with him on his front porch, I became fascinated by

Elmer's knowledge and pride in his farm. Elmer described a spring in the valley that he used to water his livestock. He told me it never runs dry. A photograph of that spring appeared in an article I wrote for Illinois Times, and few years later, my daughter, Jennifer, studied the spring for her science project."

Many Rochester residents in the 1970s recalled how Edgewood was once a beautiful farm, just as it appears in this photograph taken from the 1918 Orange Judd Pictorial.



Rochester History: The Life Story of Lucetta Putnam Stevens West—Part II

Previously:

Lucetta Putnam married Samuel Stevens in 1836 in New Hampshire and they returned together to Rochester to the Stone House to begin their life together in this developing area. By 1839, Lucetta had a 7 month old son, her husband had died unexpectedly, and she was left with massive debts. Her husband's business partner, Samuel West, accompanied her back to New Hampshire so she could be with family. However. she had 1eft her heart in Rochester and realized that she

must return. Knowing that it would be overwhelming to return to the prairie as a widow with an infant and deal with the settlement of her husband's estate, we learn that she marries Samuel West in Unity, New Hampshire in 1840. He provided the support she needed during this period of upheaval and gave her the stability she needed to make the return journey to Rochester. Upon their return, they secured the services of a Springfield lawyer, Abraham Lincoln, who assisted in settling the estate.

"Now that I had

Rochester, Mr. West and I became a part of the growth of the village. We contributed to that growth by giving my baby, Samuel three brothers and three sisters. Not only did I have the joy of my own children, but my sister, Zylpha and my sister-in-law, Permelia both had babies within months of each of my children. Even though it was a happy time to have a house full of children, I dealt with the sorrow of losing my Benjamin hen he was 8 years old. The good Lord gave me the strength to bear this sadness. My friends at the Christian Church were indeed a help. We were able to comfort and help others when they faced afflictions. As my

husband was an elder in the church, we were always aware of our brother's and sister's needs.

The children were fortunate to be educated in our local schools in addition to their spiritual schooling. Not only was my husband active in the business community, but he followed politics His brother, Benjamin, had been a State Legislator in Illinois when they first came to the area.

As I reminisce on the two decades that I have lived in Rochester, I see how the village has grown and changed. Intertwined with this is the growth of my own family. My first-born son, Samuel Stevens has recently married Olive Slater. whose family were also early Rochester settlers. My son, Samuel, now a fine 16 year old

young man, my Martha or Mattie as we call her is 13. Charles is 11, Lucy is 9 and little Louisa is jut 5 years old. My life has been filled with joys and sorrows as is our lot in this earthy life. I thank the Good Lord that I have been blessed to call Rochester my home."

[Lucetta (aged 42 years) died of typhoid fever on October14, 1859. She lived in Rochester for 22 years; from 1837-1859. Following her death, Samuel West married her sister. Zylpha. This was a common practice in this era, especially when there were voung children who still needed rearing.]

Lucetta seems to have been a blessed woman, for her first husband, Samuel Stevens, labored to provide her a unique dwelling in a prairie setting of log houses. Then, her second husband, Samuel West, even though he remarried after her death, chose to erect a lovely monument in the Rochester cemetery to commemorate their life together and mark their final resting place.

What a touching tribute to Lucetta Putnam Stevens West.
